

There is an old line that runs, 'If you feel distant from God – guess who has moved?' It picks up the theme in the Romans reading which we have just heard, 'Nothing can separate us from the love of God.'

In the midst of persecution and suffering, St Paul writes to the community at Rome to tell them that, even in their fear, desolation and grief, nothing, and no one, can separate them from God's love. This shows us that when we feel separated from God we may have walked away from him, usually through destructive behaviour that sets up and maintains distance between us and the source of our faith, hope and love.

St Matthew and Isaiah also knew that nothing can separate us from God's love. Isaiah's river of plenty and Matthew's loaves and fish are all about the *plenty* of God's kingdom, the abundance of God's goodness.

Too often we focus on the miracle of transformation that occurs in Matthew's Gospel when all he tells about the actual miracle is that Jesus 'breaks and shares'. Matthew is more interested in the leftovers than he is in the miracle itself. From five loaves and two fish we are told twelve baskets of scraps are left over.

Numbers are rarely random in the Bible. The echo of the seven days of creation would not have been lost on the first hearers of this story as Jesus takes seven fruits of the earth to feed the crowd. Similarly, the twelve baskets of scraps, the remnants of the meal at which all were filled and satisfied, echo the sign of God through the twelve tribes of Israel in the Old Testament.

For us today this story also has consoling resonance. Matthew is telling us that Jesus sees our need, does not turn us away, comes to where we are, as we are, and recreates us through the abundance of his love, so we can be signs of His kingdom in the world.

The Church has always believed that the feeding of the crowd prefigured the Eucharist, this weekly time where we receive the fullness of God in his Word, in the life of the community, in the minister and through the transformation of the Bread and Wine.

It's all about abundance. Our God has abundantly provided for us so that we can abundantly provide for all the world which is given into our care. 'Those to whom much is given, much is required.' The problem is that when we look around we see that while some of us have so much, others have nothing at all.

If this reality doesn't move us to a change of heart and right action then we have not understood the story of the loaves and the fish, that God's goodness is never intended for a select few.

Sometimes people look at the poverty in the world and think, 'How could God allow that?' This question can cause us to feel distant from God, but in light of what God has given us and our ability to share from this abundance, when we think like and feel like this, guess who has moved away from whom?

National Vocation Awareness Week

is an annual week-long celebration of the Catholic Church dedicated to the promotion of vocations to ordained ministry and consecrated life through prayer, and to renew our own prayers and support for those who are considering one of these particular vocations. It is a week for the entire Church to consider, support and pray for those searching for their vocations in life. We might think about and pray for the young people in our community and in our families this week especially. In prayer, ask the Lord to enlighten them and give them the grace and courage to respond to His call. The Lord calls each of



us to a particular vocation (marriage, consecrated life, priesthood or a single life of service).

UPDATED: As of Wednesday 1 July, the Aust. Govt. and the DBB introduced new Guidelines.

- * The number allowed to be present in a church is now to be calculated on the basis of one person to each 4m². Using this formula we can accommodate 101 persons in St Patrick's and 60 persons in St Bernard's.
- * Once the capacity in numbers is reached, the doors of the church will be closed.
- * If unwell **DO NOT** come to mass and please, see your doctor;
- * Sanitise your hands on arrival and departure;
- * Follow **ALL** directions from the **USHERS**;
- * The collection plate will be brought to you—please **DO NOT TOUCH** the plate.
- * Tap n Go is available at the back of the church for those who do not want to handle cash.
- * Normal Social Distancing is expected in and around the church at all times.
- * When Mass is concluded please leave the church quickly to allow for cleaning—please disperse immediately and **DO NOT** congregate outside the church after mass;
- * Weekday attendees MUST write your name and contact details in the book (please use your own pen);
- * Weekend masses can be booked via the parish email: parishkccp@bbcatholic.org.au
- * Your health is important to us. To ensure your safety and that of each other, please help us by following all the above points. *Take care, stay safe, stay well.*

Whilst Baptisms / Funerals / Weddings never stopped during Covid-19 it is great news that restrictions on people attending these in our churches have also been lightened inline with the numbers shown above.

MASS BOOKINGS:

When you attend Mass you will be asked if you wish to book the same Mass for all weekends in August.

This will happen again in September when you may book for another month in advance and continue in this pattern. You may still book for individual Masses via the office email, parishkccp@bbcatholic.org.au—in this way it is hoped you will be guaranteed a seat at Mass.

A letter to the People of God in the Diocese of Broken Bay \sim [Bishop Anthony 28 July 2020]

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ. Over the past fortnight, we have seen an escalation of COVID cases, not just in the State of Victoria, but also in parts of Sydney. It is worrying, but not unexpected. Some of the most vocal critics are the very same people who advocate large public gatherings and demonstrations, as well as those who seem to flaunt the physical distancing recommendations and precautionary hygiene measures.

My dear people, now is not the time to relax our vigilance as a community of the Church. The Government measures that have been in place and that we have adopted as a Diocese are for the protection and well-being of all. I would like to thank you for implementing these measures and I urge you to continue to be observant and respectful of them. As a Catholic community, it is important that we take a leading role in good citizenship. I was reminded this week that the Spanish Influenza pandemic of 1918 swiftly spread around the world and was not "under control" until 1920. While the COVID-19 Coronavirus is different to the Spanish Flu, there is much for us to learn as a community regarding how we might contribute to the safety of our society. The Flu took a heavy toll on family life. Community wellbeing was threatened continuously over a three-year period. The economy was damaged as businesses closed, workers found themselves unemployed, and basic services such as mail delivery and garbage collection were hindered due to flu-stricken workers. Thanks be to God, we have a much stronger health system in 2020 than in 1920. We also have access to cleaning and sanitising products that were simply not available to the masses 100 years ago. However, family life is just as vulnerable now as it was during the Spanish Flu because human lives and relationships are always vulnerable in moments of crisis. Likewise, the economy and the availability of gainful employment is currently under threat. Being aware that members of the community are at risk or in danger is one of our major efforts at this time. Our Parishes, Catholic Schools, and CatholicCare communities are particularly well placed to be alert to risk and they are places where people feel secure. They are for many a safe harbour in the storm.

This week, I urge you to renew your efforts to ensure that you and your family remain attentive to the need for good hygiene, at home and when you are out and about. By being attentive, you will help limit the risk in the community of the Church and therefore in our neighbourhoods and social communities. I also encourage you to pray for an end to this time of trial.

"The plague that prowls in the darkness you will not fear" (Psalm 90: 5-6)

The words of the psalmist invite us to remain faithful and to take refuge in God's unwavering love. Central to our belief as a Catholic community is that God never abandons His people in time of suffering and hardship. My prayer this week is that God will protect you and

bless you; keep you safe and defend you from all evil; and that you may persevere always in God's love. + Authory




