

Prayer for Vocation – Broken Bay

Loving God, you are the Lord who calls and sends out labourers into the harvest. In your great love you call us to belong to you, to be holy as you are holy, to be your people and to live in loving service of others. Pour out your Holy Spirit upon the Catholic community of Broken Bay, as we turn to you in faith and hope. Call from among us priests and deacons, shepherds after your own heart, to gather and guide us in your name, to serve our faith community, to proclaim your gospel, in word



and deed, to minister through the sacraments and to lead us ever closer to you. Amen.

Dear Friends, Today we reflect on the image of Jesus as Good Shepherd. There are several aspects associated with the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd. In today's reading, Jesus shows himself not only as the shepherd, but as the gate - the door to the sheepfold - which is the place where the sheep are housed or protected during the night. He sleeps at the entrance of the sheepfold, to keep them safe from thieves and wolves.

In Palestine culture or tradition, it was a bit different. Some owners simply handed over his flocks to the shepherd and they in turn looked after the owner's flocks. There is no personal connection between owner and sheep but there is a connection between a shepherd and the sheep, and this connection is something truly remarkable. It is our duty as people of faith to make a strong and life-long connection with our own remarkable Shepherd, Jesus. In Kerala, there is a tradition that all Christian families, hang Sacred images on their walls. From my childhood onwards there has always been an image of the Good Shepherd. It is the image with Jesus, carrying a sheep on his shoulders and looking after the other sheep.

This image tells us lots of things about the qualities of a good shepherd. A good shepherd should be a man of love and he should know his flock very well. To know the flock means to have a closeness with the sheep, to call them

by their names. He knows what the sheep need to feed well upon, what they need to feel secure under his protection and the sheep know the enemy can't do any harm because their shepherd is vigilant.

There is no laziness in a shepherd's life. 24/7 he is watching, caring, protecting. He is ready to give up his life for the flock. His whole interest is to look after his loved ones.

As we reflect on Vocation Sunday today, I ask that you try to connect Him to your own life. We are living in a different era, an era in which Jesus has entrusted shepherding to us. We are called to be good shepherds to everybody.

During this period of Covid-19, we all have a special responsibility to care for the welfare of our fellowmen. Our eyes should look out over our neighbourhood and seek our neighbours to ensure they are okay.

I have encountered everyday good shepherds myself. A particular cul-de-sac in Berowra has 5 houses in it and most evenings as pass by on my daily walk, all 5 households bring their evening meal out the end of their driveways and share a meal together in a special and unique way. They maintain the laws of the land but they are looking out for each other, ensuring all the sheep in their sheepfold are safe.

Priests are called by Jesus to be Shepherds of His Flock, in fact a priest is called to lead, to teach and to sanctify His flock. At present it is hard for many priests, it is not easy to offer the Mass to an empty church when he knows his flock is so eager to come back inside the physical sheepfold of the church building. So, as a priest I have prayed hard for divine assistance, to strengthen my relationship with you in special and unique ways, so I may re-assure you that the Good Shepherd remains personally connected to you, always. Parents are called to be good shepherds to their children in the family home. By loving your children, guiding your children, inspiring your children, disciplining your children, you are giving your children the security to build a spiritual nourishment in their spiritual life. Parents are called to offer selfless service to their children. God entrusted His children to your hands to look after them and protect them from the dangers of life.

Leaders of Nations are called to serve like a good shepherd to look after the needs of the people who look to them for protection from unforeseen difficulties like Covid-19. To properly care for their flock, national leaders need to create laws that are consistent for all, that protect all, that look to better the lives of the least in society, the poor and the vulnerable. When leaders truly embrace the role of a good shepherd, they will take care of their flock with no private agenda to be gained, and this way they will gain equality and justice for all. That is why Jesus presented himself to us as a shepherd, a loving, caring, and trustworthy protector sleeping at the gate of the sheepfold to keep all humanity safe from evil.

Will you allow yourself to be open and transformed by the example of The Good Shepherd?

A letter to the People of God in the Diocese of Broken Bay ~ [Bishop Anthony Monday 27 April 2020] Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

It was my privilege to greet you all through my online video message at Easter. At the time, I spoke about how we do not ignore the sufferings and burdens of others and that we accompany them with love, hope and joy. I mentioned that we are the twenty first century disciples of Jesus and that we share the Easter joy with everyone that we meet.

In times where we are required to protect our loved ones and our communities by staying home, we are challenged as to how we might share the Easter joy.

I would like you to reflect on your Parish communities and our Diocesan Charity, The Diocese of Broken Bay Charitable Works Fund (CWF)

Giving is an act of joy – sharing what we have with our Parish community and people in our Diocese is one way to ensure that the love of Jesus Christ is available to us all. ART SPACE:

THE GOOD SHEPHERD ~ c AD 425, Mosaic, Mausoleum of Galla Placidia, Ravenna, Italy.

In this week's Art Space, we continue to reflect on the Easter miracle and the gift of knowledge through knowing Christ. This lunette (above a doorway) in the Mausoleum next to an early Christian Church (now destroyed) is remarkable in that it is created to shimmer and reflect light to Christ's faithful. Created by positioning small pieces of coloured glass (tesserae) in plaster (and gold leaf) at a slight angle to the surface. The image of the Good Shepherd, seems to capture the moment where the sheep, recognising Jesus,

turn to Him. Christ, in the centre of the composition, is seated upon three steps, holding a cross instead of the Shepherd's hook. The rocks in the composition are highlighted with gold reflecting Christ's divine light and anchoring him to the earth. In the background, on the left, is a hill from which rivers flow, suggesting the four rivers of Paradise (Genesis 2:10-14). Dressed in gold, and illuminated by his halo, Jesus tenderly reaches out to the sheep on his left, as if to feed or lovingly caress.

As you reflect on this image remember that Jesus also knows each of us personally and invites us into relationship with him.

Gospel: Jn 10:1-10 ~ A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus said: 'I tell you most solemnly, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold through the gate, but gets in some other way is a thief and a brigand. The one who enters through the gate is the shepherd of the flock; the gatekeeper lets him in, the sheep hear his voice, one by one he calls his own sheep and leads them out. When he has brought out his flock, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow because they know his voice. They never follow a stranger but run away from him: they do not recognise the voice of strangers.'

Jesus told them this parable but they failed to understand what he meant by telling it to them.

So Jesus spoke to them again:

- 'I tell you most solemnly,
- I am the gate of the sheepfold. All others who have come are thieves and brigands;
- but the sheep took no notice of them.
- I am the gate.

Anyone who enters through me will be safe:

he will go freely in and out

and be sure of finding pasture.

The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy.

I have come

so that they may have life

and have it to the full.'

- on the third day he rose again from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead.
- I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins,
- the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.

Communion Antiphon:

The Good Shepherd has risen, who laid down his life for his sheep and willingly died for his flock, alleluia.

Prayer after Communion:

Look upon your flock, kind Shepherd, and be pleased to settle in eternal pastures the sheep you have redeemed by the Preciious Blood of your Son. Who lives and reigns for ever and ever.
