



The Tradition of Christmas Lights

During Advent and the Christmas season, Christmas lights brighten up many homes, streets, and churches. This tradition brings joy and excitement to all. These lights make the season feel warm and festive, helping everyone remember that this is a special time of year.

It shows us that Christ's love is stronger than sin and death. It brings warmth and comfort to our hearts. This is why Christmas lights are so special. They remind us that Jesus, the true Light, came to bring peace and joy. The lights we see everywhere are a sign of His promise to be with us always.






