Gospel Reflection

Ephphatha – "Be opened!"

Isaiah's vision of a Messiah who would come with hope and healing (today's first reading) is realized in

this episode from Mark's Gospel: the deaf hear, the silent are given voice, the lame "leap like a stag." The exhortation **Ephphatha!** is not only addressed to the man born deaf but to his disciples both then and now who fail to hear and see and speak the presence of God in their very midst.

The Aramaic phrase **ephphatha** literally means "be released" – Jesus "releases" the man not only from his disability but from his sins, his isolation from the community, his alienation from God.

Jesus' curing of the deaf man with spittle (which, in Jesus' time, was considered curative) is an act of recreation. God's reign is present in human history in the extraordinary ministry of Jesus. Throughout Mark's Gospel, Jesus insists that his healings be kept quiet in order that his full identity be revealed and understood only in the light of his cross and resurrection.

THINGS YOU DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT THE MASS

A "splash" of tradition in Mass: the commingling.

Have you ever been some place a thousand times, and yet not noticed something right in front of you?

I had this experience recently. A priest came and visited me at the presbytery, and in the living room, he was admiring some sculptured patterns of roses and garden leaves on the ceiling. And for the first time in the many months I've been here in Manly, I looked up.

I was surprised. So was he.

Attention to detail – I think I get an **F**.

Still, sometimes I wonder if this is how people feel in the Mass. See, there's this moment, right before Communion, when we're all singing the "Lamb of God", and the priest does something almost hidden. He takes the host, breaks it, and places a very small piece



in the chalice, whispering: "May this mingling of the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ bring eternal life to us who receive it." It's called the *commingling*.

So my question is: the commingling – what's the significance? Why does the priest do it? Let's find out...

Firstly, the commingling reminds us: the Mass is one. In the ancient Church, some fragments of the consecrated Host (sancta) from each Mass were reserved, and dropped into the priest's chalice at the next Mass. The gesture symbolised that, despite there being many Masses celebrated, there is really only one Mass. This is because there is only one Sacrifice of Jesus Christ, and all Masses are a re-presentation of that Sacrifice.

Secondly, the commingling reminds us: the Church is one. At the ancient papal Mass, fragments of the consecrated Host (*fermentum*) were sent by the Pope to the nearby parish churches to be placed in the priests' chalice in their Mass. These fragments were sent out to the different churches so that, in the words of Pope Innocent I, "especially on this day, they do not think themselves cut off from our communion."

And thirdly, the commingling reminds us: Christ is Risen. Okay, I must admit, this one's my favourite – because, in the Syrian Rite, while the Body and Blood separated represent Christ's death (His body in one place, His blood in another), the commingled Body and Blood together represent Christ's Resurrection (His blood flowing again through his veins as before). And so, by placing the consecrated Host in the chalice with the Precious Blood, the Body and Blood are united once again, showing that, yes, Christ has died, but now, He has risen from the dead.

...So then, dear friends, what shall we do this Mass?

Well, this week, let us remember what the Mass really is: a memorial of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

So, this week, during the "Lamb of God", when you see the priest break the tiny piece from the consecrated Host (Christ's body broken) **remember Christ's death.**

And then, when you see the priest commingle the Sacred Host with the Precious Blood, uniting His body and blood together – **remember Christ's Resurrection.**



Social Justice Statements

In a tradition reaching back to 1940, the Australian Catholic Bishops release major social justice statements each year in time for Social Justice Sunday. Through this tradition they contribute to the development of local Catholic Social Teaching. The statements encourage the Catholic community to reflect and act on social, economic and ecological issues. They remind us of the social dimension of the mission of the Church.

Below is a one page Summary of this year's Statement

Truth & Peace: A Gospel Word in a Violent World

The Australian Bishops Conference's social justice statement for 2024-2025, "Truth and Peace: A Gospel Word in a Violent World," addresses the urgent need for peace from a Gospel perspective. This document highlights the alarming levels of global and local violence, noting that the 20th century was the most violent in history, and the early 21st century continues to see numerous conflicts. In 2022, there were 55 state-based conflicts and 82 non-state conflicts affecting two billion people worldwide. Specific conflicts in the Asia-Pacific region, such as Myanmar's military coup, the persecution of Rohingya people, the crackdown on pro-democracy movements in Hong Kong, and ongoing violence in West Papua and Papua New Guinea, underscore the pervasive nature of violence and its devastating impacts.

The document discusses the erosion of truth in public life, emphasizing the rise of a post-truth culture where facts are frequently contested and falsified. This phenomenon has been exacerbated by new technologies and social media platforms that rapidly disseminate fake news and conspiracy theories, leading to widespread misinformation.

In a post-truth world, the distinction between truth and lies blurs, leading to a crisis of truth and trust. Without a shared understanding of basic facts, civil society and the rule of law are undermined, making informed democratic debate and accountability difficult. This environment allows for the rise of populism and extremism, where grievances are inflamed and followers are mobilized through disinformation. Authoritarian regimes exploit democratic processes to subvert democracy, further destabilizing societies.

Catholics are called to be active peacemakers by embracing a culture of encounter and dialogue, inspired by Jesus Christ, who is presented as the ultimate source of peace and truth. The document underscores the responsibility of Catholics to collaborate with all people of goodwill to build genuine peace based on truth and trust. Practical suggestions for promoting peace include building relationships with those affected by violence, supporting local peace initiatives, and engaging in interfaith and ecumenical dialogue. Community involvement and collective action are stressed as crucial in the pursuit of peace.

Theologically, the document positions Jesus as the embodiment of God's truth and peace, emphasizing that the fullness of peace is a divine gift requiring human cooperation. Believers are encouraged to trust in the power of the crucified and risen Christ, viewing peace as both a divine gift and a human task. It suggests that peace can be achieved through the proactive efforts of individuals and communities, guided by the principles of the Gospel.

"Truth and Peace: A Gospel Word in a Violent World" is a comprehensive call to action for Catholics and all people of goodwill to engage in peacebuilding through truth-telling, dialogue, and practical initiatives. It frames peace as a realistic and attainable goal, grounded in the teachings of the Gospel and the example of Jesus Christ. By addressing both global and local conflicts, the statement encourages a collective effort towards a peaceful world, rooted in the values espoused by the Catholic faith.

turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that?

Mark 7:31-37 (JB)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark *He makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.*

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'
