

Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph – 29th December 2024



Gospel Reflection

Today's Gospel was probably a later addition to Luke's Gospel, a story from the rich oral tradition of stories told about Jesus. Like many childhood stories of famous people, this one is retold because it shows signs in Jesus' boyhood of the qualities that will emerge in

his adulthood that will mark his life forever in history. Luke clearly has the events of Holy Week in mind in the details he has included in the story: the journey to Jerusalem at Passover, the encounter with the teachers at the Temple, the three days Jesus is lost.

At the age of 12, a Jewish boy becomes a "son of the Law" – he becomes personally responsible for following the Torah. The faithful Jesus reveals himself as the perfect servant of his Father from the time of his first legal pilgrimage to Jerusalem.

It was the Jewish practice for teachers to conduct classes not in a lecture format but as an open discussion in which participants were encouraged to ask questions. Portrayals of Jesus dominating the scene, overwhelming the teachers with the depth of his insights, are from what actually happened. As Luke tells the story, Jesus was listening to the teachers and eagerly searching for knowledge in his questions like a highly motivated and interested student typically much older than the 12-year-old boy from Nazareth.

Luke reports that Mary "kept all these things in memory" (Luke 2: 19) Perhaps Mary confronted for the first time the reality that, although she was indeed his mother, her son did not belong to her. *Connectionmediaworks*

HOW CAN THE HOLY FAMILY BE A MODEL FOR US?

Jesus, Mary and Joseph seem very different from us. Jesus is the Son of God, Mary is the Immaculate Conception, perhaps only Joseph is closer to us. And yet, when we look at their lives described in the Gospel, we will see that they had to deal with difficulties that we know from our own families. Their lives were not idyllic - they were full of anxiety, suffering and daily struggles. Pope Francis reminds us in Amoris Laetitia that every family can see itself in the Holy Family of Nazareth, with its daily hardships and sometimes even nightmares. However, it was love that made the Holy Family survive and remain holy.

The family is the place where we learn the love that God has given us. The foundation of this love is the bond between husband and wife - their mutual devotion and faithfulness. For this bond, everyone else must take a step back - parents, in-laws and even children. It is the husband who should be closest to the wife, and the wife to the husband.

Such love is not only a human effort, but above all the grace of the Holy Spirit, which is received in the sacrament of marriage. It must be nurtured daily and asked for: "So help me, Lord God Almighty." It is important to remember that on my own I cannot love as my spouse deserves - only God can teach me how to do this.

A question worth asking yourself is: How often do I pray for my spouse? Do I ask God to help me love my wife or husband as He would have me? Common prayer, and if that is not possible - prayer for each other, is the key to faithful and living love.

Prayer protects. When a husband prays for love for his wife, and a wife for love for her husband, then in a conflict situation each of them first works on themselves. Without prayer, it is easy to want to change your spouse, and when that does not work to replace them with someone else. Prayer teaches another way - to change yourself, to build a relationship based on love, which forgets about itself, in order to be there for the other person. And this is the way of the Holy Family.

PRAYER FOR OUR FAMILIES

O Jesus, Word made flesh, savior of the world, your life is for us an example of total dedication to your Father and to the work he entrusted to you. Help us to live fully our religious consecration, to spend ourselves completely in your salvific mission to the people of God.

Mary, Mother of God, obtain for us the grace of intimate union with your divine Son and in and through him with the Father and the Holy Spirit.

St. Joseph, guardian of the Holy Family, teach us to live a life of prayer, work, and self-forgetfulness, that we may become ever more docile instruments of the will of God.

Jesus, Mary, Joseph, inspire us so to live our community life, that we may be a sign to others that Christ has come, that our hope is centered in him, and that we look forward to the glory of the resurrection.

O Holy Family, bless and protect all the families of the world; safeguard their unity, fidelity, integrity and dignity. Enable them to live according to God's law that they may fulfill their sublime vocation. May their lives be a reflection of yours and may they enjoy your presence forever in heaven. Amen.

1 Samuel 1:20-22, 24-28 (JB)

A reading from the first book of Samuel

For the whole of his life, Samuel shall be lent to the Lord.

Hannah conceived and gave birth to a son, and called him Samuel 'since' she said 'I asked the Lord for him.'

When a year had gone by, the husband Elkanah went up again with all his family to offer the annual sacrifice to the Lord and to fulfil his vow. Hannah, however, did not go up, having said to her husband, 'Not before the child is weaned. Then I will bring him and present him before the Lord and he shall stay there for ever.'

Luke 2:41-52 (JB)

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

His parents found him in the temple, sitting among the learned men listening to them.

Every year the parents of Jesus used to go to Jerusalem for the feast of the Passover. When he was twelve years old, they went up for the feast as usual. When they were on their way home after the feast, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem without his parents knowing it. They assumed he was with the caravan, and it was only after a day's journey that they went to look for him among their relations and acquaintances. When they failed to find him they went back to Jerusalem looking for him everywhere.

Three days later, they found him in the Temple, sitting among the doctors, listening to them, and asking them questions; and all those who heard him were astounded at his intelligence and his replies. They were overcome when they saw him, and his mother said to him, 'My child, why have you done this to us? See how worried your father and I have been, looking for you.' 'Why were you looking for me?' he replied. 'Did you not know that I must be busy with my Father's affairs?' But they did not understand what he meant.

He then went down with them and came to Nazareth and lived under their authority. His mother stored up all these things in her heart. And Jesus increased in wisdom, in stature, and in favour with God and men.
