

Gospel Reflection Reproduced from God's Word 2019: Daily Reflections, published by St Pauls Publications, Strathfield.

There are some things we need to highlight in Luke's Gospel for today. Firstly, that Jesus had that power of spirit in him. Secondly, that he had already been active in a synagogue-teaching ministry throughout Galilee before he came to his home town of Nazareth. Thirdly, the initial response to Jesus had been one of praise. However, note too that Luke says nothing about healing! Fourthly, the text tells us that Jesus was in the habit of going to synagogue on the Sabbath—he was used to practising his faith. What is also significant is that Jesus could read, and read in Hebrew at that. At this point in history, Hebrew was not widely spoken and only a select few could read it. Indeed, the master of the synagogue would occasionally invite special guests to read and comment and it is in this context that Jesus is handed the scroll of Isaiah. The reading was a source of hope for a dispirited people, not long returned from their exile in Babylon. It comes from the heart of God and God's concern for the poor, the captives, the blind and the oppressed. By claiming that the Scripture 'is being fulfilled today', Jesus is effectively claiming that he is the One God cared deeply and the audience in the synagogue at Nazareth understood themselves as the oppressed of Isaiah's prophecy. Just as it was then, so it is now. The message of the Gospel is that we have a God who cares deeply for us. How deeply do we care for God by taking care of the poor, the captives, the blind and the oppressed?

Parish Liturgy Committee

What seasons or feasts affect the way we celebrate liturgy as a whole parish community?

Are some overemphasized... or neglected?

Are we a welcoming community?

Do regular parishioners arriving at Sunday Mass feel that this is a good place for all to be? Do visitors or new parishioners feel warmly welcomed and feel "at home"?

What in our celebration helps us praise God?

What in our celebration hinders our praise?

These and similar questions are what the Parish Liturgical Committee ponder and try and answer.

Can you help us?

If the committee is to be truly representative of the Parish then we need more people.

Ideally, the Liturgy Committee should have between seven and ten members and include representatives of various liturgical ministries (music, readers, etc) as well as parishioners who aren't involved in a particular liturgical ministry.
