Social Justice Corner

Closing the Gap Report

The 2024 Closing the Gap report, released in the aftermath of the failed Voice referendum, presents a stark picture of Indigenous disadvantage in Australia. Key metrics,



including imprisonment rates, suicide rates, and child protection involvement, have worsened, deepening concerns about the efficacy of current policies.

The number of Indigenous Australians in prison has risen to 2,266 per 100,000 adults, and suicide rates have increased to 30 per 100,000. The number of Indigenous children in out-of-home care also continues to rise, with 57 per 1,000 children affected. These alarming trends underscore the significant challenges still facing Indigenous communities, despite years of effort under the Closing the Gap framework.

Out of 19 targets monitored by the Productivity Commission, only five are currently on track. While some areas, such as preschool enrolments and land and sea rights, show progress, most measures are either stagnating or regressing. Life expectancy, though improved, remains below that of non-Indigenous Australians, with Indigenous men expected to live 71.9 years and women 75.6 years, compared to 81.2 years and 85.3 years for non-Indigenous Australians, respectively.

The report's findings highlight the urgent need for a new engagement with First Nations peoples in Australia. Catherine Liddle, co-convener of the Coalition of Peaks, has criticised the continued reliance on non-Indigenous-operated service providers, arguing that community-controlled services achieve better outcomes for Indigenous people. She emphasised the importance of Indigenous involvement in decision-making, echoing the sentiment that "nothing about us without us" should guide future efforts.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2024

Dear Parishioners

We are grateful for the wonderful support of our parishioners, many of whom work behind the scenes to assist with the day to day running of the parish. We are also grateful to our office staff who work hard to provide the support services needed to keep the parish going. We also thank our parishioners who continue to support our Parish financially.

Our deficit for the year was a lot greater than the previous year due in part to the to the shortfall in meeting our quota for the Pastoral Works (\$16,115 compared to \$8,423 in 2023) and an increase in repair and maintenance costs. However, it is pleasing to note that our income increased slightly (by \$2,464, excluding the increase in interest received) in the 2024 year compared to 2023. The increase in interest received was due to higher interest rates being received and an increase in cash on deposit.

We finished the year with \$342,530 in donations towards the renovation of the Presbytery. Since the year end, up to 7 August, we received a further \$60,596 in donations. This included one donation of \$45,000 and we thank all parishioners for their continued support. So far we have spent \$29,130 on consultants fees and after the year end we paid the first instalment to the building contractor of \$52,620. The amounts received as donations and the amounts paid for the project are not shown in the income and expenditure account. The Diocese has advised us that as these are not operating items they should be reflected in the balance sheet.

Discussions on the new parish office are continuing and parishioners will be given the opportunity to review and comment on the plans for the new office.

The Presbytery renovation is under way and is scheduled to be completed by the middle of December, when the lease on the current priest's accommodation ends. Thank you to those parishioners who assisted the parish staff in clearing out the old parish office. It was greatly appreciated.

The temporary office in the parish hall is on hold for a while as the mould has to be removed. We have had an Occupational Hygienist examine the hall and take air samples. The mould came about during COVID when the hall was closed for almost two years and there was a leak in the roof that was not noticed until the hall was reopened after COVID. The Occupational Hygienist has recommended that the curtains be disposed of as well as the carpet in the boardroom as these hold mould spores. The advice is that after cleaning the ceiling and other affected areas then repainting the hall and recarpeting the boardroom the whole area will be suitable for use. Further air testing will be done before we reopen the hall and commence the alteration for the temporary parish office.

Our parish continues to follow its mission of seeking to "Evangelise, celebrate our faith, foster community and serve God and each other." Our goal is Missionary Discipleship. We are moving from a maintenance church to a missionary one in keeping with Jesus' great commission: "Go make disciples of all nations, baptise them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and teach them to obey all I have commanded you" (Mt 28).

Our mission depends on our parishioners' support and we thank you for your contributions over the last twelve months.

Sacramental programme

The Children's Sacramental Programme is a three stage process that is delivered over a twelve month period. The first sacrament in this programme is Confirmation, followed by Reconciliation and is completed with First Holy Communion, when the children become fully initiated into the Church.

Our thanks go to Gerri Hadwen, our Sacramental Co-Ordinator, for the wonderful work she does in working with the families to prepare the children for the sacraments.

Over the year we had 129 children through the programme, 58 for Confirmation, 36 for first Reconciliation and 35 for first Eucharist. The children came from both our local Corpus Christi Parish School and the state schools in our area.

Catechists

Our catechists, led by Jennifer Perrot, put a lot of work into preparing lessons, activities of significance and attending professional development opportunities. Our catechists bring the Word of God to children in state schools in our area and assist in preparing those children to receive the Sacraments. We are still looking for catechists and would welcome further volunteers for this very important ministry. Please contact Jen Perrott at the parish office on 9144 6998 if you can assist.

To live this discipleship out of love for Christ in a way that cares for others, facilitates the effective running of this parish and influences, for the better, the world around us. Let us help each other to grow in this discipleship together.

Callect

God of might, giver of every good gift, put into our hearts the love of your name, so that, by deepening our sense of reverence, you may nuture in us what is good and, by your watchful care, keep safe what yo have nurtured.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit,

God, for ever and ever.

First Reading

From the book of Deuteronomy Dt 4:1-2. 6-8

You may add nothing to the word which I speak to you – keep the commands of the Lord.

Moses said to the people: 'Now, Israel, take notice of the laws and customs that I teach you today, and observe them, that you may have life and may enter and take possession of the land that the Lord the God of your fathers is giving you. You must add nothing to what I command you, and take nothing from it, but keep the commandments of the Lord your God just as I lay them down for you. Keep them, observe them, and they will demonstrate to the peoples your wisdom and understanding. When they come to know of all these laws they will exclaim, "No other people is as wise and prudent as this great nation." And indeed, what great nation is there that has its gods so near as the Lord our God is to us whenever we call to him? And what great nation is there that has laws and customs to match this whole Law that I put before you today?'

Gospel

From the holy Gospel according to Mark Mk 7:1-8. 14-15. 21-23

You forget the commandments of God and hold on to human tradition.

The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture: This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me.

The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are only human regulations. You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.'

He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within and make a man unclean.'
