

"What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man replied to him, "Master, I want to see." (Gospel)

Dear Parishioners,

'What do you want me to do for you?' What would I reply if Jesus asked me this question right now? The blind man not only knew what he wanted Jesus to do for him, he had no doubt that he would get what he wanted! This

is a story about hope born of deep faith. Bartimaeus had such hope—a deep certainty that this 'Son of David' he had heard so much about would have pity of him and restore his sight. The people around him didn't have quite the same certainty; instead they tried to keep him quiet. Bartimaeus was so certain of a cure that he threw his cloak off as he went to Jesus. If he'd had any doubt surely he would have clung onto his precious possession in case he couldn't find it again. Bartimaeus had hoped to see for so long and now he knew that his time had come. Story Telling from the Heart: Painting Through the Pain

Richard Campbell was born in Bowraville in 1956. His mother was Gumbaynggirr and his father was a Dunghutti man. Richard was taken from his family when he was nine years old and placed in the Kinchela Boys Home near Kempsey.

Richard will be sharing with us his story of growing up with his family, the incredible trauma of being taken away and the way his artwork kept him going through the pain.

Over two hours, participants will be invited to listen to Richard share his story, join a small group discussion and reflect on what they can do in response to this story. This is a collaboration between artist Richard Campbell, Aboriginal Catholic Ministry Sydney Archdiocese, Catholic Mission, Catholic Religious Australia and the Maitland- Newcastle Diocese.

Murphy House Sale Status

As previously announced the Diocese communicated its intention in October 2020 to sell Murphy House, which under agreement between the Diocese and the Carmelites has served as the Carmelite Priory since 2008, when the Carmelites took over the administration of the St Ives Parish. We have now been advised by the Diocese that contracts were exchanged on Murphy House on 15th October 2021 (the Feast of St Teresa!) for a sale and leaseback arrangement, whereby the Carmelite Friars will be able to continue to live there for two years at no cost to the Parish. Settlement is due to occur on 10th December 2021. It is worth remembering that under this arrangement between the Carmelites and the Diocese, since 2008 the Parish has not had to bear any costs to fulfill its responsibility to provide accommodation for the priests of the Parish.

A small group of volunteer parishioners with relevant professional expertise, under the direction of the Parish Finance Committee and with input from the Parish Pastoral Council, is working to develop options to accommodate the priests of the parish after that time. It is planned to organise forums to share these options with parishioners for discussion and feedback as soon as possible.





First Reading

A reading from the prophet Jeremiah Jer 31:7-9

I shall lead them back in mercy – both the blind and the lame.

The Lord says this: Shout with joy for Jacob! Hail the chief of nations! Proclaim! Praise! Shout: The Lord has saved his people, the remnant of Israel! See, I will bring them back from the land of the North and gather them from the far ends of earth; all of them: the blind and the lame, women with child, women in labour: a great company returning here. They had left in tears, I will comfort them as I lead them back; I will guide them to streams of water, by a smooth path where they will not stumble. For I am a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my first-born son. The Word of the Lord.

That is why he has to make sin offerings for himself as well as for the people. No one takes this honour on himself, but each one is called by God, as Aaron was. Nor did Christ give himself the glory of becoming high priest, but he had it from the one who said to him: You are my son, today I have become your father, and in another text: You are a priest of the order of Melchizedek, and for ever. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.
